Any person or group of persons acting in concert who directly or indirectly contribute \$1,000 or more in support of or in opposition to a change of organization or reorganization that has been submitted to Lake LAFCO must comply with the disclosure requirements of the Political Reform Act of 1974 applicable to local initiative measures to be submitted to the electorate. These requirements contain provisions for making disclosures of contributions and expenditures at specified intervals; they may be reviewed at Government Code §§56700.1 and 81000 et seq. Additional information about the requirements pertaining to local initiative measures to be presented to the electorate can be obtained by calling the Fair Political Practices Commission at (916) 322-5660.

A LAFCO Commissioner must disqualify herself or himself from voting on an application involving an "entitlement for use" (such as an annexation or sphere amendment) if, within the last twelve months, the Commissioner has received \$250 or more in campaign contributions from the applicant, any financially interested person who actively supports or opposes the application, or an agency (such as an attorney, engineer, or planning consultant) representing the applicant or an interested party. The law (Government Code Section 84308) also requires any applicant or other participant in a LAFCO proceeding to disclose the contribution amount and name of the recipient Commissioner on the official record of the proceeding.

Chairman Sabatier commented on the total number of streetlights and that prior to the report, he was unaware of that information. Discussion ensued on streetlight issues and the negative impact of recent P G & E enacted Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS). All Commissioners agree that despite the purpose overall, PSPS's are detrimental and pose a threat to public safety. Issues regarding the need for additional lighting along the Highway 20 corridor and pedestrian traffic were also a part of the discussion.

6. Kirsty Shelton, Rachel Lenihan and Chris Meredith, representing the Maja Development Project are present to brief the Commission on the preliminary status of the project to be located in Southern Lake County. Ms. Shelton stated that they will be requesting annexation of a portion of the property into the Callayomi Water District in order to provide services for worker housing. Ms. Shelton, Ms. Lenihan and Mr. Meredith made an extensive presentation on the plans for the project and the many amenities and services that will be available to the property owners and, some for the general public as well, such as a farmer's market. The representatives discussed the plans for many facets of the project such as power, water, wastewater treatment, preservation of open space, fire suppression, roads and easements, etc. Ms. Shelton stated that they are working on the EIR and a draft should be ready by March of 2020. EO requested that LAFCo be added to the distribution list. The representatives noted this is an initial presentation and there will be much more information and appearances to follow.

Chairman Sabatier called a recess at 11:00 a.m. and the Commission reconvened in Regular Session at 11:08 a.m.

Chairman Sabatier stated that he was called home from the meeting due to the power shut offs, but reported that he learned that with regard to water districts bigger is better and he is very pleased that the Commission acted to consolidate nine water districts into one, referring to the Cobb consolidation.

Commissioner Brandon stated that the Conference was very good, specifically the presentations. Commissioner Scholz agreed noting the presentations were very educational and he gained much from his attendance.

EO reported that the CALAFCo membership dues increase, discussed at the previous meeting, was adopted.

SUBJECT: South Lakeport Annexation Project

Honorable Members of the Lakeport City Council Honorable Members of the Lake County Board of Supervisors

As you are aware, the City of Lakeport has requested annexation of 136.78 acres more or less of land (consisting of approximately 50 parcels) located south of the existing city limits, adjacent to South Main Street and Soda Bay Road, east of State Route 29 with an application to LAFCo on August 19, 2019. This annexation also includes a detachment from the Lake County Sanitation District.

The City retained the consultant Applied Development Economics to prepare a fiscal analysis for the annexation, which report is dated May 3, 2019. The County sent LAFCo correspondence on October 2nd, 2019 strongly disagreeing with City's fiscal analysis. The County's fiscal consultant Bay Area Economics (BAE) identified a variety of issues with the City's analysis.

The City's August 19, 2019 application to LAFCo asserted that no tax exchange proceeding under Rev & Tax Code §99 was required because the 1997 property tax sharing agreement between the City and the County remained in effect and was applicable to the annexation. In its October 2, 2019 letter from County Counsel, the County asserted the 1997 Revenue Sharing Agreement was not intended to cover this annexation. The City through its legal counsel sent LAFCo a letter on November 8, 2019 responding to the County's letter. The letter disagreed with County Counsel and argued that the 1997 Revenue Sharing Agreement remains valid and applicable to this annexation.

The Local Agency Formation Commission met with legal counsel at its November 20, 2019 meeting in closed session to consider the annexation dispute. A closed session was held because of the potential for exposure to litigation depending on what determination the Commission made with regard to the applicability of the 1997 Tax Sharing Agreement.to this annexation proposal. At this meeting the Commission determined to defer a decision with respect to 1997 Tax Sharing Agreement. Instead, the Commission directed the following:

- 1. It is apparent that the real dispute between the City and County is over how the property and sales tax revenue from the Annexation area should be apportioned if it is annexed. Since there is substantial disagreement about the fiscal impact of the annexation, the Commission determined a third fiscal analysis needs to be prepared by LAFCo to provide an objective more accurate determination of the revenue and service impacts of the annexation, for both the County and the City. LAFCo will retain an independent municipal economics consultant to review the previously prepared fiscal and service data prepared by both the City and the County and any additional information the consultant may require. LAFCo's consultant will prepare a report objectively setting forth the estimated service costs for each agency within the annexation area and make recommendations for an appropriate apportionment of tax revenue. The City (as the applicant) will pay the costs for this fiscal analysis.
- 2. After completion of LAFCo's fiscal analysis, the Commission would schedule a facilitated meeting of representatives of the City, County and LAFCo with an independent facilitator regarding the annexation and its fiscal effects. LAFCo would ask that two members of each legislative body participate in the meeting to assure a more effective process. Working together in good faith, LAFCo is confident that this process will result in a resolution of the disagreements and result in a new tax sharing agreement that both parties can agree to. LAFCo will pay the facilitation costs and retain a qualified independent facilitator from outside the area.

For this process to work, both the City and the County must agree to participate in good faith. We know you all have the best interest of the community at heart and will want to participate to resolve this long-standing community service issue.

Please place this letter on your next available agenda within 30 days after the date of this letter and provide a response to LAFCo as to your Board or your Council's willingness to participate in good faith. Please understand that if your agency does not choose to participate in this process, LAFCo will have no alternative but to proceed to make a determination on the applicability of the 1997 Tax Exchange Agreement to the annexation application before LAFCo.

Notice of Vacancy on the Redevelopment Agency Oversight Board of Lake County

CALL FOR NOMINATIONS

Dear District Manager and Board Chair:

This letter is being sent to you as an invitation to your district to nominate a member of your board of directors for the position of *Special District Representative to the Consolidated Redevelopment Agency Oversight Board for Lake County.* The letter describes the process of selecting the special district representative.

Reason for Nomination

In 2011, the State of California dissolved redevelopment agencies throughout the state and created some 400 redevelopment agency (RDA) oversight boards as successor agencies. In 2015, Senate Bill 107 further directed that these oversight boards be consolidated into a single consolidated redevelopment oversight board in each county. The Consolidated Redevelopment Oversight Board for Lake County oversees the dissolutions of the redevelopment agencies in Lake County to include the disbursement of certain cash assets of the former redevelopment agencies to the county, cities, school districts, and special districts that share in the general 1% property tax. The independent special districts have a seat on that Board to help assure that the proper distributions are made.

Up to seven members are allowed on each countywide RDA oversight board, one of whom may be a member appointed by an <u>independent special district selection committee (ISDSC)</u>. The ISDSCs, where they exist, are comprised of the presiding officer, or his or her designee, of every independent special district under the "umbrella" of the Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO). Pursuant to state law guiding LAFCOs, the Committee meets to appoint special district representatives to serve on LAFCOs. While Lake LAFCo has special district representation, there remains no independent special district selection committee in Lake County.

Selection of Special District Representative

When no ISDSC exists or when it is not feasible for the ISDSC to meet, state law authorizes the LAFCO Executive Officer to manage the business of the Committee. State law allows provision of ballot materials from LAFCO and response from a district by electronic mail, with the prior concurrence of the presiding officer of the district or his or her alternate as designated by the governing body.

Process to Select Special District Representative to County RDA Oversight Board

The process consists of nomination and election periods. Based on the 2011 law, the Governor will make the appointment on behalf of independent special districts if a special district representative is not appointed. Since the previously appointed member is no longer on an Independent Special District Board of Directors, LAFCo is assisting with the recruitment of a member to fill the seat vacated by Randy Williams who sat on the Lakeport Fire Protection District Board of directors

Nominations

- Boards of directors may nominate any board member as a candidate for the RDA oversight board special district representative position.
- At this time, a formal ballot is <u>not required</u>. A written nomination letter will be sufficient if it provides the name of your nominee and the District Board on which he or she serves. The nomination must be made by an <u>official action of your Board of</u> <u>Directors and signed by the appropriate Officer of the Board.</u>
- Nomination letters must be returned to John Benoit, Executive Officer, Lake Local Agency Formation Commission, P.O. Box 2694, Granite Bay, California 95746 by <u>Wednesday, February 12, 2020</u>, by U.S. Mail. Alternatively, you may email your district's nomination to j.benoit4@icloud.com.

Elections

- After the close of the nomination period, Lake LAFCO will determine if a formal election
 is required if more than one nominee is submitted. If only a single nominee is
 submitted, that person will be declared the RDA oversight board special district
 representative and no further action is necessary.
- If multiple nominees are submitted, a mailed ballot will be provided to each district eligible to vote for the special district RDA oversight board representative.
- For the election to be valid, at least a quorum of the special districts listed above must submit valid ballots. The candidate receiving the most votes will be deemed elected as the RDA oversight board special district representative.
